

THE FRANKENMUTH WOOLEN MILL

Not long ago I was listening to WJR radio and an interview with the owner of the Frankenmuth Woolen Mill and found it particularly interesting as we were planning a Thanksgiving time trip to that area. Upon searching the internet, I came up with the website: www.wool-bedding.com and found the address of the business and information about the company and its long and interesting history in the town of Frankenmuth.

Established in 1894, by Franz Ranke and associate George Grueber, the mill was the first woolen mill in Saginaw County producing horse blankets, mittens and socks for lumbermen and wool comforters. The mill grew substantially by producing army socks during World War 1.

Through the years, the company has changed hands a few times but continues to use the same equipment purchased in 1894 and uses the same process to produce the custom wool bedding along with other items. The opportunity to see this machinery heightened my interest.

In the back of the retail store, behind glass, is the operating

woolen mill. Driven by overhead line shafts, the machines, although not operating during our visit, are visible as is the wool washing station in the basement. Several claw foot bath tubs serve that purpose. The line shaft, still in use, is driven now by a large electric motor and the belts, now guarded by steel structures, can be seen winding throughout the room. I would have enjoyed seeing it in operation during my visit. Maybe next time I will try to arrange a group tour which is available. Meanwhile, I'll just imagine the belts spinning the pulleys to drive the huge machines.
